Richardson's landmark legal and civic work serve as a backdrop for the discussion regarding disparate

Held last September over two weeks, the 9th Quadrennial International Violin Competition of Indianapolis was filmed in its entirety by WFYI's production crew. From more than 200 hours of footage, comes this documentary ? a one-hour program that takes viewers inside the contest. You'll meet the 37 young contestants and see their performances, hear from judges, host families and other contest insiders, and feel the ups and downs of this competition as it culminates in the launching of a concert violinist's career.
